### Kindergarten - Mrs. Schultz

1 paint shirt  
1 water bottle with a lid  
1 large box of Kleenex  
1 box of Ziplock bags (Boys bring gallon size, and girls bring sandwich size.)  
1 container of Lysol disinfecting wipes  
1 backpack  
1 folder with pockets  
2 dry erase marker sets of 4 (8 total markers. Put name on these boxes as I will save them and kids will use throughout the year.)

Mrs. Schultz will provide items such as pencils, crayons, erasers, glue, and scissors.

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### Letter from Mr. Ippensen, Principal

"It is what you read when you don't have to that determines what you will be when you can't help it." - Oscar Wilde

My fifth and sixth grade teacher, Miss Venteicher, told me once that anything I learned beyond what we learned in class was something no one could ever take away from me. That thought has stayed with me for the past 30 years, and as we prepared for the summer, one of the things I told our junior high and high school students was to read over the summer. Reading is a skill, like shooting a basketball or hitting a ball. If our children don't continue to read – throughout the summer, once they have their AR points, when they don't have anything else to do – they are limiting the development of a skill which can help them throughout their entire lives. What people gain when they read for enjoyment are different perspectives, new thought processes, even an appreciation for different people and cultures. Those gains are something no one can take away, and when we have to make decisions in our lives, when we are who we are when we can't help it, what we have learned – what we have read – will help us make those decisions and be the people we want to be.
