

The Grind with Mrs. Coffey

September! Ace serves, pick sixes, state fair, the fight song playing, laughter in the classrooms, and school staff making a difference while walking hand in hand with our students, families, and community. September is also the month that every School Board across the state approves the annual budget for the current school year: September 1, 2020 to August 31, 2021.

What are some examples of our financial goals as a district?

- Have at least 3 months of operating expenses in cash reserves. This cash on hand is necessary in order to continue business during the months where we receive smaller tax draws from the county treasurer's office. An approximate, projected amount for one month would be \$300,000. Therefore, over time, we want to build our general fund cash reserves to approximately \$900,000.
- Utilize a 10+ year capital improvement plan to project completion dates of projects, the estimated costs associated with those projects, and the tax asking needed in order for the improvement plan to come to fruition.

What does the draft budget look like for the current year?

- 2.87% decrease in property valuations for the district.
- General Fund increase of \$300,000 in tax asking.
 - To build approximately \$150,000 into our general fund cash reserves.
 - To build approximately \$150,000 into the depreciation fund (to continue building and purchasing based on the 10-year capital improvement plan).
- If we were to utilize the previous year's valuations, we would be a little over an 8 cent levy increase for 20-21.
- QCPUF had a tax break last year and is projected to go back to the original tax asking seen in previous years.
- Total tax asking for all funds grow a little over \$408,700 when compared to last year.

Speaking of finances, did you know that Shickley Public Schools was the recipient of TWO Nebraska Community Foundation Matching Grants with our local Shickley Community Foundation? In total the school will receive approximately \$40,000 (\$20,000 from each Foundation) in order to purchase Chromebooks (already here and being utilized in grades 3-6), iPads (for 1:1 integration in grades K-1), and RedCat amplification systems for students with hearing loss/concerns and also to combat the residual hearing concerns that may occur during mask-wear and social distancing.

We have a lot to be thankful for in our little town; the support of the Shickley Community Foundation and our tax paying constituents allow our school to build on a solid foundation.

6th Grade, by Mr. Schroeder

Wow, this is all interesting isn't it? One thing that never ceases to amaze me is how resilient students are when it comes to change. Obviously there have been a lot of new things that we are implementing for various reasons concerning COVID-19 issues. However, from a personal standpoint, it has been amazing to see the students overcome and deal with it. I know they are handling it better than me.

The beginning of the school year is always interesting, because from the teacher side, we don't always realize how far our last class came through the year, so when the new class starts it's easy to think "Wow, how are we going to ever get anything done?" But we always do, and it's no different this year after a couple of weeks into the school year. Students are picking up on the new day to day routines. They understand what they will need for classes and the expectations of those classes. They are learning how to navigate new responsibilities, maintain and build friendships with both former students and new ones, and develop rapport with their teachers.

One of the changes that K-8th grades are implementing this year is a new math curriculum. The setup of this is much different than what we were doing in the past. Speaking for the 6th and 7th grades, our setup is basically on a two days per lesson approach. Day 1 is intended for learning and practice, day 2 is a quiz and "remediation" or self learning. The remediation days allow those that understand a concept to apply it to higher ended questions and expand the lesson. If students are having difficulty on a lesson, the remediation allows for students to get extra practice and have time specifically devoted to them to grow and improve with their teacher. The students seem to be liking the new format. We will get a better idea of how our retention is, but at this point the results have been positive.

The month of September will present a handful of of days where we will have Growth Testing through our MAPS tests. With all the circumstances of the past few months, do not be shocked or concerned one way or another with the results of these tests. The goal of MAPS is to get a quick snapshot of where we are at so we can guide our focuses for the year. I'm sure there will be quite an interesting array of results to take in.

Hopefully we will get to continue moving forward with everything this year. We ask that everyone continue to stay strong and willing. I think we would all agree that it is worth it to have kids in school whether we agree with the stipulations or not. I feel sorry for the kids that have already been taken out of school due to their situation in other towns. Seeing that makes me feel like our little sacrifice is pretty minimal when it comes to being able to see our students, our co-workers, and to see the community that a school is able to bring together within its grounds.
